Message from a Community Outreach Pastor

Dear Friends,

"Turn left. We want families to turn left and not just right". This was the hope for my role at Rochford Methodist Church, to see families turn left into the church sanctuary and not just right into the community space. However, before we could see that happen, we needed to build up our wider community links and to reach out to the families themselves.

Along the way we have had a lot of fun and made some great friends. For me this is key, to go beyond seeing families as conversion targets but as friends. To enable the community to become involved in what we are doing, to support us and to allow projects to grow organically. We have done this as a team, the various events and clubs would not have been possible without others being willing to help.

At its heart, I am looking to serve the community, to bless them and to share Gods love in a practical way. With the area being one of high deprivation, removing any financial barriers is also important.

The work that I have been involved with can come under the following broad headings:

Assemblies

I lead Christian assemblies in two primary schools, aiming for them to be fun and engaging, with a Christian message weaved in. The kids enjoy them and I get invited back on a regular basis. I would say that my willingness to follow the school topics, being reliable and flexible to the schools' needs have all helped.

VE Day Party / Summer Party / Light Party / Easter Party

I have organised a variety of parties and events. These have been a great time for the various parts of the church community to mingle and to deepen friendships with those in the church. They have loosely followed a messy church approach of craft, food and a short bible-based talk. For the summer party we had a bouncy castle, while for the VE Day celebration funding was secured from Rochford Parish Council and this paid for extra decorations, with sausages and chips for everyone.





Lego Club

Running after school on a Monday, our Lego Club has proved incredibly popular with families. We have built up a lovely community, a place where Lego is built, games are played and quality coffee is drunk. Healthy snacks are provided as the timing is when kids have the post-school hunger phase. A weekly Lego raffle is run, as a way of blessing the kids. A grant for this and the parties was secured from Sanctuary Housing. Lego club has also provided a place for families with links to our Happy Cup Toddler group to bring older siblings to.

Garden

The church did not have a garden, it had a gravel patch. That was until some of our Lego Club families, who have green fingers, offered to build an allotment for us. Now we have an amazing supply of tomatoes, strawberries and radishes growing. This garden really did grow organically, and it gives another focus for kids and adults at Lego Club.

Cooking Club

Last summer we ran our first cooking club, and we have now run many subsequent holiday cooking events. Our current summer cooking club was fully booked within 24 hours. The idea is simple. Kids love to cook, parents and carers are looking for creative activities to do over the holidays and so much the better if lunch is provided. We have taught how to cook simple meals like flatbread pizza, upside down cake and pancakes to name a few. As it encourages healthy eating in an area of high deprivation, I was able to secure funding from Sanctuary housing. We gave a slow cooker for each of the families that attended, which was a blessing.

Jamming on the Third

We have developed our all age worship service into a more creative and contemporary service aimed at those who are new to the church. This has been linked with craft events and has built on the monthly kids church. It has encouraged families to turn left into the sanctuary and not just right. We are seeing green shoots as families start to explore more about Christianity, which has been exciting to see.

We have seen friendships deepened and a good number of families coming into the wider church community. We are building a community, which is exciting and we are having the opportunity to share the love of Jesus with these families and starting to see people turn left. For me, the point when I realised we had a community was when our car was scrapped and a Lego club family lent me a mini. We still have the mini and it is a reminder that our families have just as much to give us as we do them.

Ripples from the Empty Tomb

Written in 2020, this article was originally circulated electronically to the community at Maldon in 2020 during the lockdown.

The 26th March 2020 was three days after the lockdown was announced. It was a sunny day so I went into the garden to play with my camera. We have a picket fence that has seen better days and one of the wooden posts that holds it up has a knot in the wood. It would be a nice challenge, I thought, to capture the knot with a macro lens. This is the kind of lens that gives big pictures of tiny things and as I normally like to capture images of landscapes, I don't often use my "macro" lens.

Image 01 on the left is the post in all its glory and if you look closely and follow the red arrow you can make out the knot, it's about $\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter in real life. It at the top on the left-hand side.

Now move on to image 02 below, which is the knot captured with the camera mounted on a tripod using the "macro" lens, which is probably about ½" away from the knot. The knot is still only ½" diameter, however we see a more detailed view of it. Simply put the macro lens allows us to see something that's there all the time, but we don't notice it.

How often is God "there all the time" in our lives, maybe in the actions of others or simply in nature all around us and yet we don't see him. Echoes here I think of the story of the road to Emmaus.

Now look at the cross more closely. Well, in fact there is nothing there, the wood has split because I have not maintained it over its 30 years in the garden. What we see is a dark space in the shape of a cross. It reminds us that, like the people who sought Jesus body after his crucifixion, he was not there, he is risen, the tomb was empty, just like the "cross" here is empty.



Now look again at the image and the circles around the knot radiating or rippling outwards from the centre of the cross that isn't there. I see the circles as the Church (the body of Christ) down the centuries, radiating God's message in Jesus to people far and wide and radiating it from an empty tomb. One of the first ripples was to include people who were not Jews, people like you and me. God used Cornelius as a channel to achieve that part of his plan.

Our place in Christian life is in one of those circles. We may be old and battered, crinkly at the edges, however our clear purpose is to continue to spread the message outwards, near, far and wide. Look at the image again. There are diagonal cracks in the knot leading out from the centre and perhaps we can see these are channels through which we can deliver the message and to use different means to take the message further.

So then, when you are "carrying on" this week, you might feel like the fence post which could fall over, which is battered and gnarled and if you do, think again. Look at the cross and radiate out from it to be with and serve others in the name of Jesus. Pick up the phone and talk to someone, write a letter, talk to people on your daily walk. All of these are opportunities to continue to spread the message as it has been spread down the centuries.

It's now 2025 and both the post and the fence have fallen and been placed in the re-cycling bin!

Greenbelt 2025 Hope in the Making For me Greenbelt is HOPE

Thursday

Easy journey with Bob and Anne Briant. Greenbelt campers getting organised carting their tents etc from their cars to the campsite – a way bit off in the distance – we were just getting our wrist bands and programmes. All very easy. Then a bite to eat at the Campsite Hub and of course a cup of tea. Refreshed and already pondering which events to go to for three whole days – onward to the Hotel. Meeting friends in the lobby, totally unplanned, lovely room and then a swim, evening meal and rest.

Friday

Hotel breakfast – fried bread – thank you and off to Greenbelt. Talks, worship and workshops already begun. People wanting to listen, learn, be involved, babies in carts and slings, toddlers running free on the grass, many mobility scooters O so much freedom for all ages. A community, respectful, calm, safe, smiling in the sunshine all intentionally seeking 'something'

What are you seeking?

My first talk, in the shelter tent, was with Miranda Threlfall-Holmes exploring the text in Ezekiel 37 and the Valley of the Dry Bones. She began explaining that there were just over 150 comments on HOPE in the Bible but not many on making hope. For this talk then she had chosen the phrase 'our bones are dry, and we are hope less'. For the first 35 chapters of Ezekiel the people are in exile, and their country lies wrecked, everything lacks hope. Ezekiel through vivid visions is challenged by God to speak out about all that they did wrong – to prophecy – a calling out especially to their leaders and to turn to God. One vision is of the Valley of the Dry Bones with the valley referring to Psalm 23. The bones do listen; they stand together like a community having lived through a trauma and are now becoming hopeful. By coming together, telling our stories – sometimes wrestling with them we can become more hopeful.

Miranda then gave us an activity to do. There probably were about a 100 people in the TENT called SHELTER. We were to create a Haiku (a Japanese poem of 3 lines and 17 syllables). In small groups we were to create / choose a first line of 5 syllables and put on one postit, a second line of 7 syllables and put on a second postit of a different colour and finally the third line of 5 syllables on the third coloured postit. Once done we placed them on the 3 edges of the small, raised stage at the front of the TENT. One of the group then chose another 1 line from the edge of the stage to take back to the group. I offer you 2 examples:

Valley of Dry Bones
Put breath in you, you shall live
We have a future

Mortal, can bones live? Thus says the Lord to the bones Join with HOPF we live

Wonderful I was back at Greenbelt learning and being involved in Worship.

Next onto Remembrance for Peace with Wild Goose (part of the Iona Community) and CND. A short talk and then over to the gathered group to come up with ideas for Remembrance services: Poppies – red, white, black and purple; friendship bracelets, world map and candles on areas of conflict and the importance of personal stories. As I am taking the Remembrance Sunday at Wesley this year you may get one or all of these.

Still with Wild Goose a panel of 4 people in their twenties and thirties discussing 'The Church I never knew I was looking for?'. Their attendance and love of their church was encouraging.

Brain needing a rest. 'Grace Notes' was next. A jazz ensemble offering gentle movement and music to reflect the scriptures, wonderful. Continuing the relaxed mediation theme a walk through a labyrinth on the grass.

Getting on for 5pm so to the Tiny Tea Tent. Fill up my flask and survey the eateries – a roast pork burger will do. Sat listening to the Xcerts – a little loud and not really my music. A slow walk to the car and the hotel.

Saturday

Back with Miranda Threlfall-Holmes exploring Exodus chapter 5 – bricks made without straw. This needs quite a lot of explanation, so I am going to offer this for the November Clarion. The second half she led us through corporately composing a Psalm – really inclusive – maybe I will try this in a service.

In the pagoda tent I sat listening to the actor Adjoa Andoh, best known as *Bridgerton's* Lady Danbury, is a Christian and who has had a very interesting journey into acting. She is a member of the Church of England and just a couple of quotes I hope I have got correct: - 'God meets us where we are' and 'God is better than a fag!' We need to remember that every day is a miracle, and we are all capable of being a light for those around us. So, hopeful.

Next to a service by the Magdalene Community Church – a church that is always outside regardless of the weather, with all ages especially young children and families. Glad it was sunny but most of us were in the shade. It was a joy to watch the toddlers and the relaxed manner of the parents. Leaders' voices had to be loud as no microphone so were not always clear but no matter the message God's love was clear.

A trip to the Tiny Tea Tent followed by a talk by Charlotte Gale about setting up a 'new' church in a former bookshop in Coventry Cathedral, being self-sufficient, inclusive, small and varied. Again, this was encouraging that people were coming to faith in our modern busy world.

Another trip to the Tiny Tea tent and dinner listening to the wonderful 'The Longest Johns' for me folk sea shanties – a joyous fun time – gigging about, clapping and having a feel-good time for about an hour before beginning to think about the hotel and some well-earned sleep.

Sunday

Communion for all, sitting at the main stage with about 15,000 people believing and worshipping together in sunshine. The communion is all about inclusivity and this year was no different. We were led by Ezra Solanky — a 10-year-old Greenbelter, and an 82-year-old, Rev Sue Parfitt. She was one of the first women to be ordained as a priest in the Church of England and is possibly about to be charged with terrorism for supporting the banned Palestinian group. Other supportive organizations were Two:23, Symphony Collective and St Columba's Church, Oxford.

We began with a traditional hymn of 'Great is Thy Faithfulness' and then to a not so well-known John Bell song 'Christ's is the world in which we move' with a lovely refrain: -

'To the lost, Christ shows His face
To the unloved, He gives His embrace
To those who cry in pain or disgrace,
Christ, makes, with His friends, a touching place'

After prayers and readings, we were in groups of 10-12 to offer each other communion of bread and wine – Ribena – intergenerational, friends and strangers – silence, peace, joy and fun.

There is always a collection and this year it was 50% to Greenbelt to organise next year and 50% is to go to the relief and restoration projects in Gaza though the charity Christian Aid. Although I did not get to a tent/stage called the No Fly Zone, this was where discussions on the Holy Land took place. An art installation, the Gaza Lighthouse stood shining a light for the Holy Land and the Palestinians throughout the festival.

After the communion I went to a talk by Ruth Harvey at Wild Goose entitled Hope in every Breath. This was very informative and scriptural but in discussion and feedback the most memorial comment was there is more good than badness inside us and that brings HOPE. This was then encouraging us to make as many acts of kindness as we could as this offers others HOPE.

The weekend coming to an end and I had not even been to the Hope and Anchor – a tent organised by the Methodists. Dropped in, chatted to old friends and then to the bookshop tent. Yes, it is a good resource and of course had to buy some books.

Loaded up began reluctantly to wander very slowly to the car.

Definitely going back next year. Anyone want to join me?

Loving through a Broken Heart A talk by Rev David Hardman at Trinity Methodist Church in Basildon Liaison Officer for the Methodist Church in Jersualem

I attended this talk about the history, geography and theology of this region in a calm and thoughtful gathering on the 3rd August 2025.

Rev David Hardman began by explaining why he had embarked on a series of talks. He lives when in Jersualem overlooking the Church of England Cathedral St Georges. This area is not part of Gaza. Recently he was concerned for the caretaker that cared for the building as he had not seen him for some time. The caretaker was fine — the simple answer was he was not allowed through a checkpoint barrier for a whole week. He had done nothing wrong he was just trying to get to his place of work to enable him to earn a wage and feed his family. There was no reason given to explain why the checkpoint had been closed.

David then took us through the theology of the 'promised land' and the more up to date areas of occupation through an understanding of 'settler Colonialism' Zionism' 'Occupation' 'Oppression' and 'Apartheid.' Highlighting the Balfour Declarations of 1926 and of 1948 and the 6 Day War of 1967 and condemning the taking of hostages by Hamas on Oct 4th, 2024.

For me this was illuminating but also very sad as what came across was the ordinary Israeli and Palestinian simply want to get on with living their lives.

In the Question-and-Answer session the final question was 'What is the way forward?'

Firstly, there is no easy answer. Secondly, it is important that both Israelis and Palestinians have homelands and equal humanitarian rights to govern themselves. This would indicate a two-state solution. Thirdly, one state where all people can have equal humanitarian rights – a dream as there has been so much conflict and bloodshed?

So as a beginning maybe a two-state solution but let the ordinary people decide – again maybe an impossibility but just sometimes the impossible can become reality.






